Description: Life histories, ecology, behavior, taxonomy, and identification of lotic and lentic aquatic insects. Field collections of aquatic insects and discussions of habitat preferences and water quality influences.

Learning outcomes: After completing this course, students will be able to: 1) identify all aquatic insect orders without the use of a taxonomic key and common families of Wisconsin using a dichotomous key, 2) describe the collection methods and collect aquatic insects from major habitat types, 3) describe the general ecology, behavior, food habits, life cycles, and water quality factors affecting the distribution of aquatic insect groups, and 4) construct a scientific collection of aquatic insects.

Required Course Materials: "Guide to Aquatic Invertebrates of the Upper Midwest" by R. W. Bouchard Jr. (text rental). **Recommended Course Materials:** Waders, rubber boots, and a collecting buddy.

Topics covered: This course covers the evolution, ecology, and resource management implications of the common orders and families of aquatic insects, with some coverage of other important invertebrate groups. For more details, see the schedule.
