Grading

40% of your grade will be based on assignments and quizzes.

- I expect to administer approximately ten assignments and quizzes throughout the semester although I may administer more.

Assignments:

- The assignments will be announced in advance and will be take-home.
- You may turn in assignments late, but no late assignment will get a grade higher than the lowest grade of assignments turned in previously.

Quizzes:

- Some or all of the quizzes may be unannounced and all quizzes will be completed in class.
- You may use your notes and other instructional materials when taking the quizzes.
- There will be no opportunity to make up a quiz. I will, instead, drop everyone's lowest score from the "assignment and quiz" section.

60% of your grade will be based on three equally weighted exams.

- I will announce the first two exams at least one week in advance. The last exam will be the final (Tuesday, May 16, 8:00-10:00 a.m.)
- You may not use your notes or other instructional materials when taking the exams.
- If your score on Exam 1 was less than 80% and your score on Exam 2 is 10% or higher than your score on Exam 1, I will raise your Exam 1 score by 10%, up to 80%. I will allow your score on Exam 3 to affect your score on Exam 2 similarly.
- If an emergency prevents you from being in class on the day of an exam, you must notify me beforehand or immediately after the exam. I reserve the right to not let you make up the exam, or to let you make up the exam while docking your grade on that exam, if you should fail to notify me. I also reserve the right to request proof of your excuse (e.g. a doctor's report).

I grade according to the following scale: A [100-95]; A- (95-90); B+ (90-87); B (87-83); B- (83-80); C+ (80-77); C (77-73); C- (73-70); D+ (70-65); D (65-60); F (60-0). Square brackets indicate that the score is included in the range of that grade. There is some *very limited* chance that I may curve down (letting 82 count as a B, for example) but I won't curve up (if you get an 83, you're guaranteed a B).

General Policies

- Disability Information: Any student who has a disability and is in need of classroom or exam accommodations is encouraged to speak with me and to contact the Disability and Assistive Technology Center.
- Attendance: I don't take attendance, so you do not need to notify me if you need to miss class. I've noticed, though, that people who regularly miss class don't do well, so I strongly encourage you to attend regularly.

- Academic Misconduct: According to Chapter 14 of UWSP's "Community Rights and Responsibilities," academic misconduct includes "[seeking] to claim credit for the work or efforts of another without authorization or citation," and assisting others to do so. Consequences of academic misconduct may extend from an assignment to repeat the work to a failing grade in the course and the inclusion of a written reprimand in the student's disciplinary file.

A course in critical thinking will help you to find problems with other people's reasoning. Thus a course in critical thinking will help you to win almost any argument and the ability to win arguments is always respected and admired so this course will help you to be respected and admired by all your friends and family. Furthermore, by taking this course, you'll avoid making mistakes because critical thinking will prevent you from having any false beliefs.
