A Note from the Playwright

I used to *hate* horror movies. A somewhat jittery person by nature, I avoided any film that could be deemed even remotely scary and dismissed the entire genre as tacky and gratuitous. Then, as part of my dramaturgical research for UW-Stevens Point's production of *Heathers: The Musical* last year, I decided to marathon some of the movies that influenced the darkly comedic style of the original 1988 Heathers film. On my list were classic slashers like *Halloween, Friday the 13th*, and *A Nightmare on Elm Street*.

To my surprise, I absolutely loved the campiness and intensity of these old-school horror films—as well as their impressive practical effects. With just a carefully-timed spray of red syrup and a few gruesomely detailed prosthetics, early pioneers of special effects makeup were able to create some of the most memorable and viscerally appalling moments in horror history. I found myself deeply fascinated by these strange and innovative artists. What kind of person devotes themselves to bringing blood, gore, and death to vivid life on the screen? How might such a career impact one's sense of empathy? The idea had its teeth in me, and I knew I had to write about it.

To contrast this world of artificial injury, I wanted to explore characters who were suffering from very real pain of their own. In writing the play, I strove to depict the struggles and self-destructive behavior of these women with both sensitivity and honesty. It was a challenging balance to strike, but I tried hard to bring a compassionate truth to these difficult topics as I worked on the script that eventually became *Cutaway*.

You may be asking yourself, "*Cutaway*? Hold up. I came to see *The Six-Fingered Woman*." Don't worry, you're in the right place. Welcome to the exciting world of new play development—a world that sometimes includes such things as title changes. *Cutaway* is still a work in progress, and has continued to evolve since the Department of Theatre and Dance announced our season last year. The new title is just one of many such alterations.

I am very fortunate to have been guided through this process of revision by my mentor and director, Tyler Marchant. I'm incredibly grateful to both Tyler and the Department of Theatre and Dance for this opportunity, and to our cast of talented, driven women for bringing the play to life. Finally, I'm thankful for you. Just by being in this room—by absorbing and responding to the words I've written—you have become a part of the creative process of this play. Thank you so much for coming, and I can't wait to hear what you think of *Cutaway*.
