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Psychology Faculty Earns Statewide Teaching Honor

Department of Psychology Katz Distinguished Professor Jeana Council has won every faculty category award during her tenure at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Council is honored this year with the Universities of Wisconsin 2025 Board of Regents Teaching Excellence Award.

Council joined her alma mater of UWSP in 2003. Since her earliest teaching days, she has strived to keep innovating and engaging with students. Her work encompasses sound research. For example, as part of the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL) Scholars program in 2010, she collected data to assess learning and personal outcomes for students who participated in service learning as part of her course, Positive Psychology. Students served for area non-profits, dedicating 4,000 hours in their service-learning projects and raising over \$26,000 from fundraising efforts in the process. And further, her students personally benefited.

Dr. Council assessed her students' levels of positive and negative affect and other types of functioning before and after service-learning. The results were published as part of SoTL research in multiple scholarly outlets. Her assessments have demonstrated students' levels of happiness increase with service.

Her analysis of service learning was recognized nationally by groups including the American Psychological Association's Society for the Teaching of Psychology (STP) Award for Infusing Diversity into Teaching, among others.

Outside of the classroom, Council has grown the Psychology Human Services internship program immensely in her 15 years as coordinator. Students are placed with 75 sites in Wisconsin and surrounding states, working with students to get them connected to applied learning in their home communities. Those workplace experiences boost student confidence and drive successful graduate school admissions and employment by her former students.

In fact, UWSP '07 graduate, Rhea Owens, professor of psychology at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, enrolled in the same graduate program as Council, The University of Kansas, for the Counseling Psychology doctoral program. She set an engaging example, Owens said. She remembers Dr. Council as a dynamic lecturer who emphasized her own clinical examples she would share through her work in private practice. This instilled a crucial understanding for Owens.

"I distinctly remember Dr. Council's perspective and her sharing, 'there is more to a person than their diagnosis,'" said Owens.

The two went on to collaborate over a period of years. Owens was a student research assistant on Council's learning outcomes analysis, gauging the impacts of team-testing as opposed to solo testing in studies. Those endeavors resulted in publications and conference presentations.

Since Council's earliest teaching experiences during graduate school, she desired to model effective active-learning approaches. She developed SoTL projects that could foster her students' intellectual growth. In one, she used a clicker response system to elicit student responses in real time. It also gave students anonymity regarding their answers to sensitive questions and increased their participation rates.

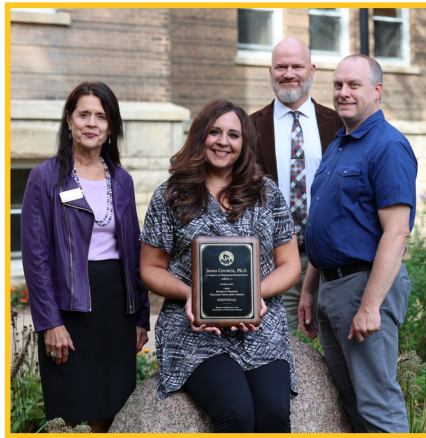
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“As a teacher, I feel I can contribute to student learning of those things most worth knowing via fostering open-mindedness, developing critical-thinking abilities, and helping students to learn to appreciate and work with other people. I see the content of what I teach as a significant part of the picture, however, I see the process of how it is taught to be of the utmost importance,” Council said.

The passion for learning that Council modeled for '25 Psychology: Human Services graduate Mickey McGuire instilled values she uses in her position as a deflection specialist for the Marathon County District Court. Discussions brought people together and empowered the students to share ideas.

“Her classes really solidified my interests. She cultivated a space that was so welcoming with differing opinions,” said McGuire. “Her teaching style and passion, you could just feel it in the classroom.”

She said Council emphasized a strength-based treatment approach in working with clients. That is something McGuire leans on routinely while working with adults who have substance use challenges. The

district court program works with community partners to place people into treatment programs and services for mental health and substance use, where it applies, as opposed to answering the charges in the court system. McGuire said she feels she is well positioned to make positive impacts through her two internship experiences and her psychology degree work.

“I really lead with what clients say are their strengths and by taking a collaborative approach,” McGuire said.

Council will no doubt continue to demonstrate engaging teaching methods for her students and strive to keep analyzing those teaching strategies in her career. The esteemed Board of Regents Teaching Excellence Award comes with \$7,500 in award funds to be used toward program development activities to enhance Council's ongoing work.

Alumni Honored at Homecoming Celebration

The UW-Stevens Point [Alumni Awards](#) recognize those who have made an impact in Wisconsin and beyond. University leadership and friends gathered to celebrate the newest honored alumni at an evening celebration for Homecoming 2025 on Oct. 18, 2025.

The **Lifetime Achievement Award** is given to graduates who, over the course of 20 years or more since graduating from UWSP, have achieved overall greatness in professional, service or personal areas.

Frank, '70 and Kathleen Haeni '70, were longtime educators prior to their retirement. They have supported students at UWSP through volunteer service, endowed scholarships, faculty-mentored undergraduate research, the College of Letters and Science Undergraduate Research Symposium and the Olson Museum of Natural History. Their recent commitment created an endowment to fund laboratory repairs, equipment purchases and maintenance in what is now the Frank R. and Kathleen Y. Haeni Chemistry Biology Building. Kathleen was a seventh and eighth grade science teacher for 24 years. During her career, she was also a part-time naturalist while in New York and was the Camp Bird Director for the School District of Crivitz from 1986-2010. Frank taught science education for 33 years.

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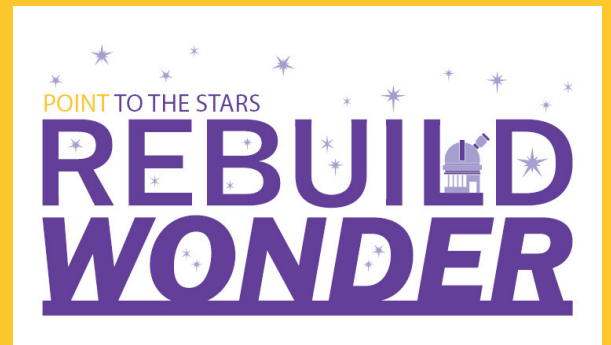
